Area One - Eltham and Kidbrooke (amount available £222,632)

Organisation Name	Site, Proposal and [amount sought]
Blackheath Football Club Limited (Rugby Football Union)	Blackheath Football Club, Kidbrooke Lane, Eltham, SE9 6TE To replace the existing hot water cylinder, valve, and shower heads, and to purchase a water softener unit for the shower and bathroom areas, to provide the BRFC community with hygienic and comfortable shower facilities. The club host a range of activities including being the base for Millwall FCs football academy; hosting community 5 a side football; American football; rugby league and summer camps for local boys and girls of all abilities. Eltham Hill School	Eltham Hill School, 122 Eltham Hill, Eltham, SE9 5EE Funding is sought to help develop the theatre space at Eltham Hill School, creating a professional space that could host a variety of performances/events. The funding would provide new curtains, creating a backdrop that could be projected onto. The space could be used for music performances, assemblies, conferences, visiting speakers and events that would benefit not only the school but local community groups and providers who could book the space for a fee from Eltham Hill. Friends of Avery Hill Park	Bexley Road, Avery Hill, Eltham, SE9 2PG The project proposes a number of measures that will improve Avery Hill Park as a wildlife resource for the borough. The project includes: (1) Creating a new pond for aquatic/amphibious species, adding to the natural environment and visitor experience; (2) Creating a six-acre wildflower meadow with a variety of species to increase biodiversity, lock-up carbon in the soil and reduce water run-off into the streams and the system; (3) Planting more trees to further enhance the landscape, adding a greater diversity of species and complete the community woodland; (4) Creating a tree trail to encourage walking and appreciation of nature, with leaflets and signs; (5) Enriching the community wildflower cottage garden; and (6) Enhancing the new terrace rose garden. Friends of Queenscroft Park	Kingsground, Middle Park, Eltham, SE9 5EL To build a new path that will improve access to the park, playground, gym and seating area near the former paddling pool and lake. The current path is damaged and unsafe, and providing a new path will improve access for people with disabilities as well as young children in pushchairs. It will also improve safety for all park users. [£15,500]
Friends of Southwood Park	Southwood Park, Southwood Road, New Eltham, SE9 3QE To construct approx. 173 x 1.7 meters of tarmac path from the back field entrance to the picnic area, thus completing a perimeter path for the recreation field giving access to all ages and abilities. The area becomes very wet and muddy during the winter months with standing water making access difficult for all. [£35,144]

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<p>Gordon Primary School</p>	<p>Gordon Primary School, Grangehill Road, Eltham, SE9 1QG To extend and refurbish the Sports Hall changing rooms in order that they can be used by school children and by the local community - the changing rooms are too small and there are too few toilets. The project would remove the leaking Velux roof windows and repair the roof, extend the changing rooms by incorporating a cupboard and re-plastering the walls. The defunct shower would be removed, and two new toilets and sink units installed. The foyer to the Sports Hall would be improved replacing the external doors (improving security), also replacing the tattered carpet and redecorating. [£37,500]</p>
<p>Horn Park Friends</p>	<p>Horn Park, Gavestone Road, SE12 9BH The Council have assisted in upgrading the lower Alnwick Road entrance, so that it can be used as the main disabled access. GNGF funding is now sought to build a tarmac path that will connect two existing tarmac paths and open up a rather forgotten but lovely corner of the park. The path connection would create an additional path loop for all park users, especially disabled park users entering from the lower Alnwick Road entrance. [£19,734]</p>
<p>Middle Park Community Centre Ltd</p>	<p>Middle Park Community Centre, 150 Middle Park Avenue, Eltham, SE9 5SD The toilet and bathrooms at the Centre are in vital need of modernisation, decoration, repair and refurbishment to meet the growing demand and meet standards to provide a better environment for our visitors. The constant need for repairs and maintenance is eating away at funds desperately needed to provide our vital services. The project will revitalise male, female and disability access toilets and bathrooms, ensuring hygienic and more efficient facilities. The Community Centre receives over 1,200 visitors per week, with activities that offer community support including childcare, community engagement, safety and most importantly friendship and a warm safe space for people of all ages. The Centre also support groups with additional needs, works with the local police and schools as well as hosting and supporting RBG events. [£7,668]</p>
<p>Roots4Life</p>	<p>Roots4Life, The Baker Centre, 245 Footscray Road, SE9 2EL To improve the front entrance security at Roots4Life due to increased visitors and visibility. This will include adding electric gate automation to main front entrance gates and video entry to front door and CCTV over the outdoor food storage unit. [£35,000]</p>
<p>St Mary's Eltham Community Centres Association</p>	<p>Progress Community Hall, Admiral Seymour Road, Eltham, SE9 1SL Various community groups use the kitchen at Progress Hall. Funding is sought to improve the kitchen facilities for users and staff providing new storage units and worktops. The facility supports the elderly and disabled, as well as also groups presenting entertainment, amateur dramatics and dance. [£5,112]</p>

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<p>St Mary's Eltham Community Centres Association</p>	<p>Progress Community Hall, Admiral Seymour Road, Eltham, SE9 1SL Funding is sought to install new front doors to make the building more secure for staff and users and combat ASB and painting of outdoor walls, woodwork, pipes and gutters. The Progress Estate is a conservation area, and the buildings woodwork needs saving from the elements. Various community groups use Progress Hall. [£15,980]</p>
<p>The artFix Circle</p>	<p>Artfix, 3 Cranfield Walk, Kidbrooke Village, SE3 9EX To provide Kidbrooke families with an all-weather soft play area. [£18,000]</p>
<p>The Friends of Oxleas Woodlands</p>	<p>Jack Wood, Eltham, SE9 1YB To install a 200m section of all-weather pathway forming part of the lower path in Jack Wood. By improving the pathways, providing safer and more passable routes, more people will be able to enjoy this valuable and enriching experience, providing access for a wider range of users throughout the year. The project will help prevent degradation of the woodlands and help to improve biodiversity through the management of path verges and glades. [£24,000]</p>

<p>Deptford Creek Heritage Trail</p>	<p>C10 pathway, Ha'penny Hatch Bridge, SE10 8JL To produce nine story boards that establish and maintain a Creekside heritage trail that will bring the story of Deptford Creek to life for local residents including families and children. The story of the Creek's past and present, its innovative industrial heritage, its social history, its biodiversity and its impact on today's climate emergency will add to community cohesion by underlining our common history. Each story board will have a section for children. GNGF funding is sought for Phase One - the CreekLink Heritage Trails most important single Information Point, situated by C10 pathway and Ha'penny Hatch Bridge. [£8,879]</p>
<p>Friends of Meridian School</p>	<p>Meridian School, Old Woolwich Road, SE10 9NY The project aims to promote play, raise awareness of climate change, and foster community along the Meridian line: (1) Seed Exchange - participating schools will exchange seeds from edible plants grown in countries along the Meridian line. These seeds will be grown under reinforced glass, in the ground or in glass cube planters; (2) Sound Exchange - exchanging meaningful messages between schools on the Meridian line as an opportunity to develop closer connections via exchanged plants. Using biodata sonification, the seedlings will produce unique music or vibrations based on their species; (3) Symbol Exchange - unique symbols will be placed along the line, representing each country it passes through. These symbols will be adopted by other schools on the line, creating unity and celebration; (4) Design Idea Exchange - this aspect focuses on collaborative design. Schools will exchange thoughts and ideas about their ideal play environment, extending this to address concerns such as climate change. [£15,000]</p>
<p>GCDA</p>	<p>31 Royal Hill, Greenwich, SE10 8RR Create a new community hub in West Greenwich accessible to those living, working or volunteering in and around Greenwich. The hub will include a community cafe; art and craft retail space to promote and support Greenwich artist and makers, as well as a gallery space to exhibit local work and topical exhibitions. There will be community rooms and a training kitchen available for flexible use and to host interactive workshops, and events that engage people of all ages in learning and innovation. There will be space for cultural programs, and recreational activities, making it a safe and inclusive space encouraging collaboration and a sense of community among its occupants. <p>GMVRA: Greenwich Millennium Village Resident's Association</p>	<p>Southern Park, Southern Way, SE10 0BW GMVRA is committed to providing events and opportunities to increase engagement to foster a strong community spirit and remove the feeling of isolation and loneliness felt when some residents move into GMV. Funding will help deliver the festival, which promotes local businesses, cultural groups and groups/clubs and promotes opportunities for people to get involved. The event is free and open to all and providing a variety of entertainment for all ages and backgrounds. The entertainment brings the community together and keeps the village social and joyful, with funding we will be able to maximise the enjoyment and able to keep it as an annual event as we are a non-profit</p>

G-West is a Community & Arts hub with users from under 5 to 50+. The main hall is used for a range of activities from dance, martial arts, performance, meetings and community events. Our smaller rooms are used for counselling, clubs, training and support groups. This area is showing severe wear including chipped paint, flaking masonry and the original wooden hall floor needs repair and sealing. The hall balcony cannot be used as it is unsafe and requires upgrading to include safety rails. The renovation of these areas would increase capacity and access to the community space and restore community pride in this facility. [£37,209]</p>
Invicta Primary School	<p>Invicta Primary School, Trevithick Street, Deptford, SE8 3HL To transform a currently under-utilised space into a community hub where families and wider networks can come together. In creating a community hub, it opens the school up to revenue opportunities in terms of sales, and rental income. The uses for the space include a pop-up cafe and space to support local events. There is also an opportunity to display local artists work, and to advertise local businesses therefore generating extra monies for the school. Collaboration with local businesses will be key to its success, such as pop-ups, but also for smaller local group meet ups such as baby/toddler groups, and social groups. We believe through close working with the school, families and the wider community that our "SE8 HUB" will be the safe haven some of our families are craving, as with the cost of living going to a commercial cafe just isn't in reach anymore, whilst our "SE8 HUB" will be. James Wolfe Primary School with Centre for Deaf Children	<p>James Wolf Primary School with Centre for Deaf Children, Randall Place, SE109LA To create an inclusive play space for children with special educational needs. With a designated specialist provision for deaf children and a reputation for being a fully inclusive school, we now have many children coming to our school with more complex needs. We therefore need a space that children with complex needs can play with independence. These children are often unable to use public play spaces due to sensory overload or accessibility. Our spaces are rented out to organisations, particularly for enrichment activities and holiday clubs. If we were to have this area, the local offer could be improved significantly. [£50,000]</p>
Montessori Education for Autism (MEfA)	<p>135 Westcombe Hill, Blackheath, SE3 7DP To upgrade our two computer systems which remain from foundation of the charity in 2009. This will increase our capabilities in recording the daily progress of each child by text, photographs and videos. We also need to acquire the ability to maintain our telephone and email Helplines to ensure that all those seeking help are responded to appropriately. We will also benefit from portability, enabling us to respond during holidays and other school closures. [£6,635]</p>

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<p>Mycenae House</p>	<p>Mycenae House Community Centre, 90 Mycenae Road, Blackeath Standard, SE3 7SE The Mycenae House ~Reach Out Project" - all-new Therapeutic Gardening Project will centre around a 20-week programme of activities and sessions using the outside of Mycenae House and its Gardens. There will be 4 session per week with each one focused around specifically developed groups including 1. Dementia & Carers group, 2. Mental Health & Wellbeing, 3. Physical Disabilities Group, 4. Men’s Healthy Citizens Group. The project aims to develop better mental & physical wellbeing, enhanced self-confidence, friendship, cooperation and communication, and an enhanced community engagement, it also aims to foster a sense of pride, belonging and value in enhancing surroundings and relationships. There is also a permanent strand of site/garden development included as an outcome of the project. [£13,946]</p>
<p>St Alfege with St Peter’s C of E Primary School</p>	<p>St Alfege with St Peters C of E Primary School, Creek Road, SE10 9RB The project includes three elements: (1) Installation of a green screen around the perimeter of our playground to provide a pollution barrier for the children at our school; (2) Provision of a permanent shelter/outdoor classroom to replace the current dilapidated wooden stage, providing children with an alternative recreation space during breaktimes where they can participate in art activities or sit and talk. AS well as providing an additional outdoor classroom this will also provide some much-needed shade and shelter in our very exposed playground. We would like to install an art cupboard alongside this shelter with art resources and display doors so we can offer art activities for our children at lunchtime; (3) Artificial grass playground surface to replace our current tarmacked surface which dates from the 1970's and is very worn, patched and uneven. <p>The Bridge SE10</p>	<p>The Bridge SE10, East Greenwich Pleasaunce, Chevening Road, SE10 0LB The Bridge SE10 is dedicated to the provision of emotional and practical support, stay & play sessions, events and classes for Greenwich families, specialising in SEND activities. We want to update the adult disabled toilet to ensure compliance and make the toilet and sink more accessible. We plan to add a wall mounted changing unit, suitable for babies and larger children who due to the nature of their disability, require regular changing facilities. Our goal is to increase accessibility for existing service users and reach new families who may be anxious to attend because of their child’s disability. In addition, we plan to include a robust storage racking in our office area and refurbish the space to best utilise it for our everyday services; enabling us to have a private, confidential space area for staff and carers, MumsAid and our Mighty Acorns Project. <p>The John Roan School Association</p>	<p>The John Roan School, Maze Hill, SE3 7UD The John Roan Edible Garden aims to rejuvenate an area within our Maze Hill campus. It will provide: a tranquil environment in which our students can study a wide spectrum of subjects through a natural lens; a nurturing space where we can grow different varieties of fruit, vegetables, herbs and flowers for use in our classrooms, kitchens and community; a resource for young people, who have autism and special educational needs, to decompress in a calm, quiet place away from busy classrooms; an outside area in which our Sixth Formers can enjoy reading and studying, boosting their mental health; a new setting for our existing Eco-Champions extra-curricular club and the provision of a new after-school Gardening Club; engagement with local residents, especially those without gardens, through weekend and holiday gardening schemes; and a green, gated garden for use by local families with preschool age children. 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Trafalgar Trust 2001 Ltd	11-13 Crane Street, Greenwich, London, SE10 9NP To improve the heating and insulation of the community function room at the Trafalgar Rowing Centre. The project will replace the existing single glazed windows and door which face onto the river and are in very poor condition, with new double-glazed doors and windows. This will help local people, charities and others who use the community room for social events, charity fund-raising, education of young people, and river related activities. The rowing centre is registered as a community asset and for emergency use by the Royal Borough. The improvement will help to reduce carbon and the costs of hiring the events room. The centre is used by many groups, for example the Thames Explorer Trust, the Greenwich Society, and is popular with local people for hire for birthdays, weddings, and other life events. This project will help to make the venue more attractive for use throughout the year, at a reasonable cost. [£9,494]

Clockhouse Community Centre	<p>Clockhouse Community Centre, SE18 5QL Replace and renew some of the equipment as listed below in the Clockhouse kitchen café as in addition to operating our daily community café, we are now doing more catering for groups and charities both within the building and externally. So, the request for the additional equipment is a key element of us being able to keep up with this higher demand. Equipment to be replaced - Gas Grill, Dishwasher with drain pump x 2, Bain Marie, Panini Contact Grill, Chest Freezer, Twin Tank / Basket Countertop Fryer, plates, spoons cups, utensils, pans, pots, oven trays, Duality Toaster. As well as the Clockhouse staff and café customers, the kitchen is also used by GCDA to deliver 50 cooking classes per annum who would also benefit from this project. [£6,100]</p>
Clockhouse Community Centre	<p>Clockhouse Community Centre, SE18 5QL To install new flooring in two of Clockhouse’s most used halls - the Henry Grace and The Prince Royal. They have not been resurfaced for a long period of time and need replacing. (£15,792)</p>
Clockhouse Community Centre	<p>New Charlton Hall, 217 Maryon Road, Charlton, SE7 8DB To renovate and replace the existing kitchen at the New Charlton Hall. (£3,300)</p>
Friends of Hornfair Park	<p>Hornfair Park, Shooters Hill Road, SE18 4LX Friends of Hornfair Park launched in March 2023 and are committed and enthusiastic about getting the park back on the map and making it a place for family, friends, and community to come together. The project is to invest in the park infrastructure both for community benefit and environmental improvement to ensure the park is fit for the future. The project is in four parts: (1) Understand our park: facilitate community participation in an ecology survey to provide a baseline assessment of the park and identify specific opportunities to improve biodiversity; (2) Refresh and renew our planting and landscape: build on community participation to develop plans that improve safety, reflect ecology survey outcomes, are resilient to climate change, accessible, low maintenance, and bring joy to park users all year round; (3) Grow our park community: provide tools and storage, together with Friends of Hornfair Park bibs, to enable wider community participation in volunteer litter picks and gardening and promote conversations with park users; (4) Build park infrastructure to benefit the community: add two new self-closing playground-style gates to the picnic area to make it a dog-free space for groups of families and friends with young children to enjoy. 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<p>Michael Streete Foundation (MSFDN)</p>	<p>Woolwich Works, The Fireworks Factory, 11 No 1 St, Royal Arsenal, SE18 6HD Pop-Up Empowerment Hubs to address the impact of development in the Woolwich Arsenal area by providing a responsive and adaptable support system for disadvantaged, racialised, and marginalised young people (aged 13-31). The ongoing development in the region has created challenges for the local youth, including increased demand for already limited resources and opportunities. Our 11-month initiative directly responds to these challenges through pop-up hubs, offering life & career skills workshops, mentoring programmes, and community/creative outreach initiatives. By taking a proactive approach to engage and uplift the youth, the project aims to mitigate the negative effects of community development and empower individuals to navigate and contribute positively to their evolving communities. We plan to utilise Woolwich Works as well as open spaces throughout the borough to bring better vibrance and positivity to community members, fostering a sense of connection and collaboration among participants. <p>Pound Park Nursery School</p>	<p>Pound Park Nursery School, Pound Park Road, Charlton, SE7 8AF Remove existing fixed garden infrastructure and replace and revitalize astroturf and soft undersurface across garden. Install new garden furniture reflecting best practice in outdoor play provision, with a focus on inclusive infrastructure that will benefit children with SEND and their families. [£20,000]</p>
<p>Samuel Montagu Youth Centre</p>	<p>122 Broad Walk, Kidbrooke, SE3 8ND To complete electrical remedial works and update the electrical systems within our community building. Samuel Montagu Youth Centre is a registered Charity that has worked with young people and local communities within the Borough of Greenwich, for over 50 years. The electrical systems are also over 50 years old and require updating to meet the current electrical safety standards. The building needs rewiring works, new electrical components, and fixtures, throughout. Completing the works will ensure that the building is fit for purpose and is able to continue to serve the community for a further 50 years. [£27,024]</p>
<p>SAVE CHARLTON ASSEMBLY ROOMS PROJECT</p>	<p>The Assembly Rooms, The Village, Charlton, SE7 8UD To repair and decorate the walls of the Main Hall. [£4,200]</p>
<p>Windrush Primary School (Charlton Site)</p>	<p>Windrush Primary School, 775 Woolwich Road, Charlton, SE7 8LN To transform the existing tarmac-covered school playground into an active and engaging outside space. We will do this by creating three zones on our school playground: an immersive nature path, a green multisport area, and a bouldering traverse wall for fitness and fun. [£30,632]</p>
<p>Woolwich Works</p>	<p>Woolwich Works, The Fireworks Factory, 11 No 1 Street, Woolwich, SE18 6HD To install automatic door openers on the remaining front doors to Woolwich Works (one door already has an automatic door, so this would be for two more doors). New openers would mean complete accessibility through all doors to the main foyer benefitting any visitors with mobility issues or additional physical needs. It would help access for Woolwich Works regular parent and baby visitors who are entering with prams and pushchairs. Currently, when off lock, the doors can be blown open causing heat loss and reduced utility efficiency, therefore self-</p>

Organisation Name	Site, Proposal and [amount sought]
Champions 4 Change Wellbeing C.I.C.	Glyndon Community Centre, 75 Raglan Rd, SE18 7LB The aim of the 24-week Boxing Empowerment Programme is to provide diversionary activities for vulnerable young people who may be at risk of involvement with gangs, drugs and the associated violence that surrounds this prohibited lifestyle. Our boxing empowerment programme uses the art of boxing and mentoring as a vehicle for positive change to empower young people and adults and helps: Improve health and fitness whilst learning the art of boxing; Improve life choices through mentoring, goal setting, career advice and skills training; Manage emotions in a constructive way; Build confidence and self-esteem; Build positive relationships; Foster a sense of community amongst attendees. Friends of Abbey Wood Park	150 Panfield Road, Abbey Wood, SE2 9DD To install 6 Abbey Wood Park welcome signs, 3 notice boards and 3 information boards for Abbey Wood Park. The project aim is to help Abbey Wood residents become more aware of the park - which typically they are not, the Park never having had any proper identity. [£19,100]
Homestart Greenwich	Eglinton Children's Centre, 3 Paget Rise, SE18 3 PY To develop our outdoor spaces to give children free time to explore and learn in new ways giving them opportunities to work their whole bodies and open the connection to nature and physical space. Installation of mud kitchen, outdoor grass topped blocks trail, climbing frame centre, shed and raised beds, sand and water table, play tunnel, planting of flowers for insects. [£8,748]
Plumstead Manor School	Plumstead Manor School, Old Mill Road, Plumstead, SE18 1QF To convert the school's 37 space car park back into a playground/area for PE and sports. This was its original use prior to the rebuild and refurbish that took place in 2012 as part of the BSF programme. The school has a significant deficit (92%) of outdoor play space for the number of children it contains. The area would be used at break and lunch time for physical activity as well as during lessons for delivery of the PE curriculum and outside of school hours to benefit the local community. Currently the main outdoor space used for PE is Plumstead Common where there are associated risks with regard to surface suitability (refuse etc) and safeguarding which need continual mitigation and review of risk assessments. The DDA compliant space would be available for local clubs, community groups and schools to use for multiple sports activities and line markings would ensure full compliance for wheelchair sports. Use of the facility by local primary schools would be free of charge as per current arrangements for utilising teaching spaces. Any community lettings out of hours would be subject to concessionary pricing with uptake constantly reviewed. [£30,000]

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<p>TACO!</p>	<p>30 Poplar Place, SE28 8BA</p> <p>The TACO! Community Print Studio is a new community workspace for collaborative printing, creative learning workshops, art making, and community publishing situated in Poplar Place, Thamesmead. The Print Studio will be an accessible community creative resource, providing accessible Risograph printing facilities for individuals, children, community groups, schools, business and organisations from across West Thamesmead, Abbey Wood, Plumstead, Woolwich, and the wider borough of Greenwich.</p> <p>The Print Studio has a low cost, efficient business model self-sustained through workshops, open access use, low-cost print services, training, materials and sales of print products. As a resource it will support a number of long-term artist and community projects such as the Hundred Club, adding value to community work being done by groups in the area. Our project will also transform outdoor space into a public communal garden with planting, seating, and a community notice board, supporting the studio to be welcoming and creating a greater sense of valued community space. Risograph printing is an environmentally friendly, low-cost form of printing. It is accessible and easy to learn and can produce high impact results quickly - which makes it perfect for community printing, artwork, workshops, and DIY publishing.</p> <p>[£9,984]</p>
<p>The Black Tri-Tribe</p>	<p>Thamesmere Leisure Centre, Thamesmere Drive, SE28 8RE</p> <p>The Black Tri Tribe, the first triathlon club specifically designed for People of Colour mission's to empower and inspire individuals from diverse backgrounds to embrace the world of triathlon, with a strong emphasis on inclusivity, diversity, and body positivity and providing a supportive and welcoming environment for everyone to thrive. Offering a range of support to encourage take up of the three disciplines in Triathlon, the current focus is on providing bespoke coached swimming sessions to unlock the full potential of the black and ethnic community in Greenwich. Aiming to meet the council's vision of improving the health of people living in Greenwich to take steps towards an active and adventurous lifestyle with our guided walks and cycling. The education building on the farm is a 12m x 15m portacabin type building that was bought second-hand about 10 years ago. It is used by around 2,400 school children per year from 30 local schools, as well as a toddler’s group, to provide them with unique learning experiences. The building is also used by the wider community at Woodlands Farm Trust events which are attended by over 10,000 people per year and rented at affordable rates to many local groups. The project entails painting the building’s exterior/interior and fixing its leaky roof to preserve it from irreparable damage for the next 25 years. <p>Train with Tara</p>	<p>Glyndon Community Centre, 75 Raglan Road, SE18 7LB</p> <p>To provide a safe, non-judgmental space for girls to learn and play softball in the Glyndon ward where there is a lack of sporting facilities solely for girls. In the UK by the age of 14 girls are dropping out of sports twice as fast as boys and nearly 60% of girls not meeting the recommended exercise guidelines. Girls also develop a negative attitude towards sports, which can then act as a lifelong barrier toward participating in sport.
