## Royal Borough 2011 Census Overview

The results of the 2011 Census show that the Royal Borough of Greenwich has the following sociodemographic characteristics:

- A total of 254,557 residents living in 101,045 households<sup>1</sup>. This gives an average household size of 2.52
- Almost one-quarter (24.1%) of the population are aged 0-17 (61,372 people) and 68% (173,047 people) are working-age (ages 16 to 64)
- The Royal Borough has a population density of 53.8 persons per hectare<sup>2</sup>, ranking as the 17<sup>th</sup> most densely populated London borough. Contextually, Islington is ranked the most densely populated with 138.7 persons per hectare, whilst Bromley is the least densely populated with 20.6 persons per hectare
- It has the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest number of cohabiting couple households with two or more dependent children across London (2,204 households)
- One-fifth of the Royal Borough population aged 16+ (20.6%) have no qualifications accounting for 41,082 people; the 6<sup>th</sup> highest across London
- It has the largest number of Nepalese speakers across London with 5,058 people (2.1% of Royal Borough Population aged 3+). This accounts for 26.1% of London's total Nepalese speakers
- It has 11.3% of London's Vietnamese speaking population with 917 people the 4<sup>th</sup> highest across London
- The 4<sup>th</sup> largest Black African population in London with 35,164 people accounting for 13.8% of the total Royal Borough population
- The 5<sup>th</sup> highest number of both Lithuania-born (1,979 people) and Zimbabwe-born populations (962 people) across London
- The 4<sup>th</sup> largest Buddhist population across London with 4,223 people accounting for 5.1% of the London total. Proportionately, Royal Greenwich has the highest rate (1.7%) of Buddhists across all London Boroughs;
- The 6<sup>th</sup> highest rate of social rented households (34.3%) across London, as a proportion of the Royal Borough's total occupied household spaces
- Approximately one-fifth (19.8%) of the Royal Borough's households are private rented, while 43.3% homes are owner occupied
- 91.4% (232,543) of the Royal Borough's residents do not provide unpaid care, whilst 5,410 people (2.1%) provide 50 or more hours of unpaid care per week
- 83.1% (211,516 people) of the Royal Borough's residents recorded either good or very good health at the time of the 2011 Census. However, 7.5% (19,017 people) stated that their day to day activities were limited a lot representing the 4<sup>th</sup> highest rate across the London boroughs
